If membership in a site provides free use of the material downloaded, proof of membership **MUST** be provided. Music downloaded from the free website **imslp.org** is permitted. Please write the full URL of the work being performed on the first page of all parts and copies being used. KFPA and PABC allow photocopies for the purposes of page turns, but the full score **MUST** still be present at the performance venue, in addition to an original copy for the adjudicator.

ACCOMPANISTS, DIRECTORS, GROUPS, AND SOLOISTS **MUST** USE ORIGINAL/AUTHORIZED COPIES IN PERFORMANCE HALLS.

WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION AND PERFORMANCE  
WILL NOT BE PERMITTED

KFPA may disqualify any entry **that does not adequately provide valid use** of copyrighted material in all disciplines. Dance participants are responsible for ensuring music submissions comply with all copyright restrictions that apply to source materials.

Kamloops Festival of the Performing Arts does not wish to disqualify any performer. It is the responsibility of participants, parents, teachers and coaches to read and comply with all rules governing the KFPA so that infractions do not occur.

## GENERAL RULES

### \* INDICATES NEW FOR 2025

1. The Festival shall operate under the working management of the Kamloops Festival of the Performing Arts. Any questions not dealt with in the rules shall be referred to the Board of Directors, and the decision of the Board will be final. The Festival does not wish to disqualify any participant, however if contravention occurs, disqualification could result.
2. All classes are open to amateurs only. The term *amateur* shall mean one whose principal income is not derived in any way from the discipline being entered. This does not apply to directors of choirs, orchestras, or to those bona fide students of music who teach for the purpose of applying money so earned for advancement of their musical education.
3. The KFPA is an Open Festival. The geographical area of the KFPA is hereby defined as the Province of British Columbia excluding the Lower Mainland west of Hope, and Vancouver Island. Participants from outside the geographical area described above will be accepted as Non-Competitive and will receive a written and/or oral adjudication only. No marks or placement. See General Rule 16.

### \*LATE ENTRIES, DEADLINES and DISQUALIFICATIONS

4. Entries are accepted from **November 10 – December 10** annually.
  - a. ENTRY DEADLINE is **December 10**. Exception: For Dance Technique classes only, the entry deadline is **January 10** annually. See Dance Rule 16.
  - b. Absolutely no late entries.
  - c. The Board reserves the right to refuse any entry and to determine disqualifications.

## PROTESTS

5. Protests **MUST** be submitted to the KFPA by email to [office@kfpa.ca](mailto:office@kfpa.ca) and **MUST** be accompanied by a fee of \$40. This fee will be returned in the event the protest is sustained.
6. All protests **MUST** be received within one (1) week of the conclusion of the Festival. The Honours Concert marks the final day of the Festival.

## AGE LIMITS

7. In ALL classes, the age of the participant as of **DECEMBER 31** before the upcoming Festival year will govern. In Duets and Trios the age of the **oldest** governs. In Groups, the **average age** is the age that governs.

## REGISTRATION

8. Participants, parents, and teachers are responsible for entering the correct class. Please ensure all required information for each class is included. If there are any questions or concerns, please contact the Discipline Representative before you enter.

9. Most classes are set by grade level or age. The Board trusts the integrity of the entrant to register at the level at which they are currently working only ONCE in each class. This includes GROUP classes. If, for any reason, the Discipline Representative recognizes an error in a class entry, the entrant will be contacted and the entry amended as required. Class changes may also be made by the Discipline Representative(s) after the printed program is published, if errors are not noticed until then. See Glossary for definition of Class.
10. Performer substitutes are not permitted in SOLO work. However, in Duets, Trios, and Groups, one (1) substitution will be permitted. If a substitution is required, please notify the Discipline Representative prior to the start of the performer's Class Section.
11. Any entry with more than one (1) participant on stage is considered a group for which only one registration is required.
12. **All entry fees MUST be paid by credit card at the time of registration.**
13. \*In the event of a withdrawal or cancellation, the Board regrets that **NO REFUND OF FEES** can be made.

## COMPETITIVE and NON-COMPETITIVE CLASSES

**Any Competitive Class may be entered as Non-Competitive.**

14. In each discipline of the Festival, a participant may enter only one (1) grade or age level, but may enter as many classes in that level as desired. For example, in Piano, a Grade 3 participant may enter Baroque, Romantic and Canadian classes, but all must be at Grade 3 level. A participant is not, however, limited to one (1) grade level throughout the Festival. A participant may enter Piano at Grade 3 and Instrumental at Grade 8.  
Exception: One (1) class in each music discipline may be one (1) grade or level higher.
15. The OPEN category is for participants working at the post-diploma level. These participants are eligible for Provincial recommendations and for scholarships as per each discipline's requirements.

A Non-Competitive class is a class in which there is no mark given and no placement made. These classes are NOT eligible for scholarship or for recommendation to the Provincial Festival.

16. Any individual or group may enter the Festival as Non-Competitive, provided this request is marked as such on the registration.
17. Some classes are ONLY Non-Competitive.
18. ADULT classes are Non-Competitive.

## REPERTOIRE

19. The same performance may not be used for more than one (1) class in the current Festival. In all classes, once a performance has been used, the same participant may not use that performance for a period of three (3) years
20. Concertos are to be played in Concerto classes only. If your concerto does not fit the time limit, contact your Discipline Representative.
21. Material should be appropriately chosen and edited, if necessary, for a general audience. Material that contains discriminatory, obscene, violent, suggestive or sexually explicit language or gestures is not acceptable and may result in disqualification.

## MEMORIZATION

Memorization is encouraged for all solo competitive entries.

22. Participants must perform from memory, unless otherwise indicated, to be eligible for scholarships. Please check each individual discipline for other rules concerning memory. Exceptions: Instrumental, Chamber Group, and String Sonatas.

## COPYRIGHT

23. \*KFPA may disqualify any entry **that does not adequately provide valid use** of copyrighted material in all disciplines. Dance participants are responsible for ensuring music submissions comply with all copyright restrictions that apply to source materials.

All copyrights regarding public material must be observed. Photocopies or manual copies of copyrighted material will not be accepted. The adjudicator must be given a complete original score of music or text under copyright for the duration of the performance. If originals are not available, a letter is required from the copyright holder giving permission for copying. If the selection is generally considered to be in the public domain, a letter confirming this fact is required from the publisher along with permission to copy. The use of music or text downloaded from the Internet is permissible as long as it is accompanied by receipts for the number of copies downloaded. If membership in a site provides free use of the material downloaded, proof of membership MUST be provided. Music downloaded from the free website [imslp.org](http://imslp.org) is permitted. Please write the full URL of the work being performed on the first page of all parts and copies being used. The KFPA and PABC allow photocopies for the purposes of page turns, but the full score must still be present at the performance venue, in addition to an original copy for the adjudicator.

Note: Performers must follow the underlined instructions. Use of illegally produced music or text results in disqualification.

## TIME LIMITS AND SCHEDULING

24. See applicable time limits in each discipline. Time limits must be strictly adhered to or will result in disqualification.
25. Requests for any special considerations must be noted on the Registration. We will endeavour to accommodate, *if at all possible*.
26. As soon as registration is closed, the Board shall arrange the order of the program. Classes may be divided at the discretion of the Discipline Representative.
27. Scheduling is a complex task; therefore, scheduling changes will be made only by the Discipline Representative(s) after the schedules have been published. Any scheduling changes not approved by the Discipline Representative(s) will result in the participant performing as Non-Competitive in that class.

## COMPETITION PROTOCOL

28. An original publication of the material to be performed, including Music Compositions, must be handed in to the adjudicator's table, with the FIRST BAR of each line numbered, prior to performing. Failure to hand in material may result in the performance being deemed Non-Competitive only.
29. A copy of MUSIC COMPOSITION, ORIGINAL POEM, OR OWN CHOREOGRAPHY must be submitted to the Festival office before **FEBRUARY 15**.

**NOTE:** Music for OWN CHOREOGRAPHY must be submitted in **accepted format** as per Dance Rules 18-21.

30. The **adjudicator's decision on all matters of adjudication will be final.**
31. Communication with adjudicators by a participant, teacher, or parent prior to and during the discipline in which the parties are involved is strictly prohibited and may result in disqualification from that discipline in the current year.
32. Communication regarding adjudicators must be conducted through the Festival Board.
33. Participants must be in the warm-up room or performance area fifteen (15) minutes before specific class time.
34. Supervision of the hall will be the responsibility of the Hall Supervisor, who will have the authority to remove any persons causing a distraction to the performances. On matters of organization and conduct, the decision of the Hall Supervisor will be final.
35. On matters of rules of performance, the decision of the Discipline Representative(s) or their designates will be final.
36. **\*January 10** is the deadline for To Be Announced titles (TBAs) to be submitted to discipline representative(s).
  - a. TBA titles not submitted by **January 10** will result in performing as Non-Competitive in all disciplines. Exceptions: Preliminary and Novice levels in all disciplines and Choral classes.
  - b. Entrants are responsible for submitting TBA titles to your Discipline Representative by **January 10**.
  - c. Performance of titles other than as described above will result in performing as Non-Competitive in all disciplines.
37. No participant or accompanist shall be permitted to use the Festival halls during the Festival for practice purposes. Any disregard of this regulation will disqualify the participant from performance in that discipline for the duration of the current Festival.
38. In courtesy to the participants and adjudicators, no person shall be permitted to enter or leave the hall while a participant or adjudicator is on the platform.
39. **NO VIDEO/AUDIO RECORDING OR PHOTOGRAPHY** of any kind (including cell phones) shall be permitted during the performance or adjudication. Kamloops Festival of the Performing Arts reserves the right to take official photographs at appropriate times for archival and publicity purposes.
40. Dress code: Please ensure appropriate performance attire is worn by those participating in the Festival.
41. No persons other than the participants will be permitted on the platform or backstage. Exceptions:
  - a. In Music and Speech, accompanists, page turners and a teacher or assistant for all participants aged 10 YEARS AND UNDER.
  - b. See Dance EXCEPTION in Dance Rule 26 where ONE teacher or coach may be backstage with dancers of all ages if needed.
42. **\*No special lighting or microphones shall be permitted.**

Exception: For Song and Dance classes ONLY in Stage Dance, a lapel microphone may be used. Dancers must supply their own lapel mics.

## ACCOMPANISTS

43. Participants must arrange for their own accompanists. If this is a problem, please contact the Discipline Representative.

## PLACEMENT

44. In Competitive classes, to qualify for a first-place certificate, participants must achieve a mark of AT LEAST 80 in a class. A mark of AT LEAST 75 is required for 2nd place and 3rd place certificates. In Non-Competitive classes, Participation Certificates are awarded.

## SCHOLARSHIPS, AWARDS, AND SPECIAL AWARDS – See Appendices 2 and 3

Scholarship and award amounts are dependent upon funds received annually by KFPA.

General rules 45-60 can be found in Appendix 2.

## PROVINCIAL RECOMMENDATIONS

- It is the responsibility of participants, parents, teachers and coaches to read and comply with all rules governing the Provincial Festivals.
- Refer to the Provincial Syllabus at [bcprovincials.com](http://bcprovincials.com) for complete information.
- Please direct all questions regarding Provincial Recommendations to Discipline Representative early in the registration process to ensure eligibility to the Provincial Festival.
- Choral and Virtual Group Dance entrants are responsible for the recording of their audio and video submissions.

61. Recommendations for the Performing Arts BC Provincial Festival are taken from participants of the Kamloops Festival who fall into the accepted geographical area. See General Rule 3.
62. Participants selected to represent the Festival must prove that they or their parents are permanent residents of the geographical area defined in General Rule 3 or they must study on a regular basis with their principal teacher in the geographical area as defined in General Rule 3.
63. To be considered for recommendation by the adjudicator, a participant must have performed in at least two (2) solo classes in the same discipline and received two (2) marks of AT LEAST 85 in those classes. Exception: Chamber Group.
64. The selection of those recommended to the Provincial Festival is the sole responsibility of the adjudicator.
65. Prior recommendation from an earlier local Festival must be disclosed to your Discipline Representative for the Kamloops Festival of the Performing Arts BEFORE the conclusion of that discipline.
66. **KAMLOOPS FESTIVAL of the PERFORMING ARTS ENTRANTS ONLY**
  - a. Those notified MUST inform [office@kfpa.ca](mailto:office@kfpa.ca) of his/her decision to accept or decline the recommendation **10 days** after the Honours Concert.
  - b. If the Competitor declines the recommendation, the Alternate/Merited Participant may move to the Competitor position.
  - c. If the Competitor accepts the recommendation, the Alternate/Merited Participant may become a Merited Participant.

- d. Entrants recommended as Merited Participants are NOT eligible to move to the Competitor or Alternate/Merited Participant positions unless so indicated by the adjudicator in the initial recommendation process.
- e. If the entrant declines the recommendation as either the Competitor or Alternate/Merited Participant from the Kamloops Festival, he/she may NOT change his/her mind at a later date.

**67. MULTIPLE LOCAL FESTIVALS ENTRANTS ONLY**

- a. Those notified must inform [office@kfpa.ca](mailto:office@kfpa.ca) of his/her decision to accept or decline the recommendation from Kamloops Festival of the Performing Arts IMMEDIATELY AFTER accepting a recommendation from the FINAL local festival in which they participate.
- b. If the Competitor declines the recommendation, the Alternate/Merited Participant may move to the Competitor position.
- c. If the Competitor accepts the recommendation, the Alternate/Merited Participant may become a Merited Participant.
- d. Entrants recommended as Merited Participants are NOT eligible to move to the Competitor or Alternate/Merited Participant positions unless so indicated by the adjudicator in the initial recommendation process.
- e. If the entrant declines the recommendation as either the Competitor or Alternate/Merited Participant from the Kamloops Festival, he/she may NOT change his/her mind at a later date.

**68. PROVINCIAL EXCELLENCE CLASS**

- a. At the recommendation of the adjudicator, competitors for the Provincial Excellence class may be chosen in several disciplines. A delegate chosen by the adjudicator will be someone who is performing at a very high level, generally higher than that required for recommendation to Senior Provincial classes. A delegate won't necessarily be chosen each year. See Dance Rule 36 for more Dance information.
- b. A Festival may send any number of qualified competitors to a Provincial Excellence class upon an adjudicator's recommendation.

### DANCE RULES

Please read specific discipline rules as well as information on Scholarships and Awards at the end of each discipline plus Appendices 2 and 3 before registration.

### ENTRIES

#### a. Solo Classes

1. Time Limit – SOLOS must not exceed three (3) minutes.  
Exception: The SONG AND DANCE category, which may be four (4) minutes).
2. In ALL Solo classes, the age of the participant as of DECEMBER 31 before the upcoming Festival year will govern.
3. No substitution of dancers is permitted in solo classes..

#### b. Group Classes

4. Time Limits  
DUETS and TRIOS must not exceed 5 (five) minutes.  
**GROUPS must not exceed five (5) minutes.**  
**STAGE PRODUCTION NUMBERS must not exceed ten (10) minutes including set up.**

5. In ALL classes, the age of the participant as of DECEMBER 31 before the upcoming Festival year will govern. In Duets and Trios the age of the **oldest** governs. In Groups, the **average age** is the age that governs. See General Rule 7.
6. Group classes are to be entered and identified by Selection Title or a Unique Group Name (dance studio or city not accepted).
7. For To Be Announced (TBA) selection titles see General Rule 36.
8. One (1) substitution is permitted. For more than one (1) substitution, approval of the Board is required. See General Rule 10.
9. If a substitution is required, please notify the Discipline Representative prior to the start of the performer's class section.

c. **Novice Classes**

10. Novice classes are **Non-Competitive**.
11. Participants have never had dance lessons before the September immediately preceding the Festival.
12. Novice Groups require ALL participants be at the Novice level.

d. **Technique Classes**

These classes allow the adjudicator to view the participant in an unprepared performance, showing the participants' knowledge of vocabulary and performance of dance steps.

See General Rule 47, Scholarships and Awards for Dance plus Appendices 2 and 3.

13. Technique classes are NOT solo classes.
14. Technique classes are **mandatory** for Scholarships and for recommendation to the Provincial Festival. See General Rule 47. A Technique class is not required for an Adjudicators' Choice Encouragement Award. See General Rule 53.
15. Besides the required Technique class, to be considered by the adjudicator for Scholarships and for recommendation to the Provincial Festival, a participant must have performed in at least two (2) solo classes in the same discipline and received two (2) marks of AT LEAST 85 in those classes. General Rule 62.
16. \*For TECHNIQUE CLASSES ONLY, the entry deadline for registrations is **January 10** annually. See revised General Rule 4.
17. The DRESS CODE is as follows:
  - a) \*For Solo and Group classes: Bare feet or socks only permitted in Modern and Interpretive Modern dances. No formal dance footwear permitted in Contemporary or Interpretive Contemporary dances. Footwear integral to the theme of the dance may be used.
  - b) For Technique classes:
    - i. BALLET TECHNIQUE CLASS – For dance participants 10 YEARS and OVER  
 GIRLS: Pink tights; solid colour leotard; hair in a bun; ballet slippers.  
 RAD exam skirt optional.  
 BOYS: Light-coloured shirt; dark tights; ballet slippers.
    - ii. MODERN TECHNIQUE CLASS – For dance participants 10 YEARS and OVER  
 Leotard or tight-fitting top; jazz pants or unitard in dark, solid colour; hair tied back; jazz thongs or socks, or no footwear.

- iii. JAZZ TECHNIQUE CLASS – For dance participants 10 YEARS and OVER  
Leotard or tight-fitting top; jazz pants, shorts, or unitard in dark, solid colour; hair tied back; jazz footwear.
- iv. TAP TECHNIQUE CLASS – For dance participants 10 YEARS and OVER  
Leotard or tight-fitting top; jazz pants, shorts or unitard in dark, solid colour; hair tied back; tap shoes.

## MUSIC SUBMISSION

18. Music for each dance entry (including Own Choreography) must be provided in digital format. Wav format is preferred but will also accept MP3. UPLOAD to DanceComp Genie by midnight on **MARCH 1** of the current year.
19. Backup music on a flash drive or USB preferably. If necessary, we will accept music from a phone.
20. Participants are responsible for ensuring copies of recorded music comply with all copyright restrictions that apply to source material.
21. Material should be appropriately chosen and edited for the Participants and general audience. Material that contains discriminatory, obscene, violent, suggestive or sexually explicit language will not be accepted and may result in disqualification.

## PROPS

22. \*All performers must be in age-appropriate costumes. Props for all performances are optional and must be lightweight and easy to handle. Quick set-up is essential. No sets are permitted.
23. Prop set-up and removal must be done by the performer, teacher, coach or parent.
24. Provincial rules may differ. See the PABC Syllabus at <https://www.bcprovincials.com/syllabus.aspx>

## BACKSTAGE

25. The Hall Supervisor, theatre personnel and participant are permitted on the stage platform and backstage during performances.
26. ONE teacher or coach MAY be backstage with a participant. SEE GENERAL RULE 41.
27. Participants must NOT receive assistance with a performance at any time.
28. Participants must NOT practice on the stage or the backstage areas during any session. Any Participant using the stage (walking around, marking out a dance, etc.) before, during or after a session will be DISQUALIFIED.
29. Centre stage will be marked.
30. All tap shoes MUST be removed before and after competing.

## RECORDING

31. Recording a performance or adjudication without WRITTEN CONSENT from the choreographer or adjudicator will result in DISQUALIFICATION from the entire current Festival.

## PROVINCIAL RECOMMENDATIONS

32. A Participant MUST perform at least two (2) solos and enter a Technique class within the SAME discipline of BALLET, MODERN or STAGE at a local Festival.
33. A Participant MUST receive a mark of at least 85 in BOTH solos.

34. The First Solo performed at Provincials MUST be the qualifying solo, as selected by the adjudicator from the local Festival.
35. See General Rules 66 and 67 re accepting or declining recommendations.
36. See General Rule 68 - PROVINCIAL EXCELLENCE CLASS
- i. At the recommendation of the adjudicator competitors for the Provincial Excellence class in Dance may be chosen. A delegate chosen by the adjudicators at KFPA will be someone who is performing at a very high level, generally higher than that required for recommendation to Senior Provincial classes. A delegate chosen for this class would be expected to be at the standard of apprentice level of a professional company. A delegate won't necessarily be chosen each year.
  - ii. A festival may send any number of qualified competitors to a Provincial Excellence class upon an adjudicator's recommendation.
  - iii. **COMPETITIVE dancers age 19 and 20 years** who enter at the local level must meet the eligibility requirements for non-professional status as described:  
*All competitions shall be open to non-professional performers who are living or studying in BC and who are selected by adjudicators at festival affiliated with PABC. This condition does not apply to those bona fide students of the performing arts who teach for the purpose of applying the money so earned for the furtherance of their education, and does not preclude occasional remuneration received for services rendered in the arts.*
37. **See Provincial Rules for Dance at <https://www.bcprovincials.com/syllabus.aspx>.** All information regarding the submission of the Virtual Dance Group video recording will come from the Provincial Office. Virtual Group Dance entrants are responsible for the recording of their video submissions.

<b>CHARACTER BALLET</b>	Ballet technique with stylized movement. The Dancer must portray a specific character, real or fictitious for the duration of the entire solo, and must incorporate the whole body but not tell a story. One (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>CONTEMPORARY BALLET</b>	Incorporates classical ballet techniques with greater range of movements which may not adhere to strict body lines for classical ballet. This style includes non-traditional movements, such as more relaxed steps, floor work, and turned in legs, etc., to portray the concept of being more innovative, free and earth bound. The physical interpretation of the theme that the choreographer envisioned allows for more expressive emotions and feelings. One (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with lyrics permitted. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>DEMI-CHARACTER</b>	Dancer portrays a story/idea/concept/impression while performing ballet technique from the waist down and character from the waist up. Pointe shoes, one (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>DEMI-POINTE CLASSICAL</b>	Dance based on any method of classical ballet technique (e.g. Cecchetti, RAD, Vaganova, etc.). Soft shoes and one (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>INTERPRETIVE BALLET</b>	Dancers must use ballet technique incorporating the body as the medium of expression and interpretation of the music to portray an intangible thought or mood, real or imaginary. This category should express an idea but not tell a story.



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	Ballet shoes (soft shoe or Pointe) must be worn. No props permitted. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>NATIONAL</b>	Not including Folk Dancing or Highland Dancing Participant required to select one (1) country only, and portray, by costume and dance, the traditional dance style of that country. Original choreography should be plotless and musically driven without narrative or mime. Dancer's movements should be the main artistic medium. One (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>NOVICE NON- COMPETITIVE</b>	Any class may be entered as NOVICE. Participants have never had dance lessons before the September immediately preceding the Festival. Novice Groups require <b>ALL</b> participants be at the Novice level.
<b>POINTE CLASSICAL</b>	Dance based on any method of classical ballet technique (e.g., Cecchetti, R.A.D., Vaganova, etc.). Pointe shoes, one (1) hand-held prop may be used if integral to the dance. Music with NO WORDS. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>BALLET TECHNIQUE</b>	<b>Not a solo class.</b> Required for Scholarship and Award, and Provincial recommendation.

<b>MODERN</b>	
Lyrics and/or vocals permitted in the music in the MODERN category. Ballet shoes (soft or Pointe) and Jazz shoes (full or half-sole) NOT permitted in the MODERN Category.

<b>CONTEMPORARY</b>	Free movement of dance encompassing various Dance disciplines with modern technique as its underlying base, such as the choreography of William Forsythe, Wayne McGregor, Akram Khan, Ohnad Narin (Gaga), Hofesch Shechter (Release Technique), etc.- a constantly evolving style of movement that explores and gives physicality to human ideologies and concepts with emphasis on engaging the whole body. <b>INTERPRETIVE MODERN</b>	Dance that uses a recognized/codified modern technique to tell a story, express a feeling, interpret a character, behavior, or emotional state. Movement should be related to the intent of the music. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>MODERN</b>	A stylized dance form with its foundations on a technically based discipline such as Graham, Limon, Cunningham, Humphrey and Horton, etc. Dance that rejects the limitations of classical ballet, was formulated from natural rhythms, and which favours movement derived from contraction and release, breath, suspension, fall and recovery, weightedness, and dynamism. Movement may or may not be related to the music. No lip-syncing permitted.
<b>MODERN TECHNIQUE</b>	<b>Not a solo class.</b> Required for Scholarship and Award, and Provincial recommendation.
<b>NOVICE NON-COMPETITIVE</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Any class may be entered as Novice.</li> <li>• Participants have never had dance lessons before the September immediately preceding the Festival.</li> <li>• Novice Groups require <b>ALL</b> participants be at the Novice level.</li> </ul>

<b>STAGE</b>	
Lyrics permitted in all STAGE categories. Lip-syncing not permitted except in VARIETY and ADDITIONAL REPERTOIRE categories. In all forms of STAGE DANCE (except ACRO) there shall be NO MORE than three (3) acrobatic elements in the number.	
<b>CLASS</b>	<b>DESCRIPTION</b>
<b>ACROBATIC DANCE</b>	A style of dance that combines Dance techniques with acrobatic elements to seamlessly blend the two mediums. Must be 50% Dance and 50% acrobatic movements. A simple prop may be used if integral to the Dance. Mats may not be used and will not be provided. No lip-syncing permitted
<b>JAZZ</b>	Dance technique based on isolation of the body and contraction/release. Music may contain words. Discretion required for suitability and to prevent disqualification. See General Rule 21 and Dance Rule 21. No lip-syncing permitted. Stage participants qualifying to attend Provincials with either a JAZZ <b>OR</b> LYRICAL JAZZ solo <b>MUST</b> choose second solo from one (1) of: ACROBATIC DANCE, TAP, SONG AND DANCE, STREET DANCE/HIP HOP or THEATRICAL DANCE. Second solo may <b>NOT</b> be another JAZZ solo.
<b>LYRICAL JAZZ</b>	A Dance that is generally performed to slower tempos and interprets the intent of that piece of music. This category <b>MUST</b> use soft jazz technique and style utilizing facial and body emotion to portray an idea, story, mood or feeling. Music may contain words. Discretion required for suitability and to prevent disqualification. See General Rule 21 and Dance Rule 21. No lip-syncing permitted. Stage participants qualifying to attend Provincials with either a JAZZ <b>OR</b> LYRICAL JAZZ solo <b>MUST</b> choose second solo from one (1) of: ACROBATIC DANCE, TAP, SONG AND DANCE, STREET DANCE/HIP HOP or THEATRICAL DANCE. Second solo may <b>NOT</b> be another JAZZ solo.
<b>NOVICE NON- COMPETITIVE</b>	Any class may be entered as Novice. Participants have never had dance lessons before the September immediately preceding the Festival. Novice Groups require ALL participants be at the Novice level.
<b>STAGE PRODUCTION NUMBER</b>	Is for very large groups. A combination of all ages and dance techniques. Vocals, lip-syncing, and words on tape permitted. <b>THIS ENTRY DOES NOT QUALIFY FOR SCHOLARSHIP OR PROVINCIAL RECOMMENDATION.</b>
<b>SONG AND DANCE (WITH OWN VOICE)</b>	A routine suited to a stage production. Equal effort in dancing, live singing, and acting will be an integral part of the overall performance. No recorded vocals are permitted. Song and Dance solos may be four (4) minutes in length. No microphones or lip-syncing permitted.
<b>STREET DANCE/ HIP HOP</b>	A constantly evolving form of dance that relies on individualism and personal style and emphasizes the expressive power of movement. Should include, but not be limited to, choreography that incorporates a blend of contemporary funk and street style with jazz technique. May include moves such as gliding, popping, locking, waving and utilize house, old school and new school. May also include gymnastics/power moves or any series of tricks or stunts as long as music, costumes, and lyrics are age appropriate. Music may contain words. Discretion is required for suitability and to prevent being disqualified. See General Rule 21 and Dance Rule 21. No lip-syncing permitted.

<b>THEATRICAL DANCE (Formerly VARIETY)</b>	<p>Dance suitable for a stage or musical production, cabaret, a review, live theatre, etc. Contents must be predominately Dance, choreography should have a character base to it without straight line work; must be composed of a diversified vocabulary of steps and may utilize any Dance genre. Live voice is not permitted; lip-syncing is permitted. Music may contain words. Discretion is required for suitability and to prevent being disqualified. See General Rule 21 and Dance Rule 21. Lip-syncing permitted.</p>
<b>TAP</b>	<p>Arms are complementary and coordinated to the footwork. The rhythm of percussion is articulated through the feet and the entire body. The emphasis is on the clarity and shading of sounds, whether they are regular rhythm or syncopated. NO dubbing of tap sounds permitted in accompaniment. Music may contain words. Discretion is required for suitability and to prevent being disqualified. See General Rule 21 and Dance Rule 21. No lip-syncing permitted.</p>
<b>JAZZ TECHNIQUE</b>	<p><b>Not a solo class.</b> Required for Scholarship and Award, and Provincial recommendations. Registration in both Stage technique classes is recommended but not mandatory.</p>
<b>TAP TECHNIQUE</b>	<p><b>Not a solo class.</b> Required for Scholarship and Award, and Provincial recommendations. Registration in both Stage technique classes is recommended but not mandatory.</p>

## OWN CHOREOGRAPHY

This entry is **NON-COMPETITIVE** (No Marks or Placement) and **DOES NOT** qualify for scholarship or Provincial recommendation.

1. Participants **perform their own choreography** of dance, choosing their own music and theme suitable for entry into each category and following definitions of dance.
2. Participant **MUST SUBMIT** Choreography Notes detailing steps, counts, direction of travel on floor plan, and theme of dance, **BEFORE FEBRUARY 15. Email in PDF format to: [dance@kfpa.ca](mailto:dance@kfpa.ca).**
  - a. Notes should contain the following:
    - I. Use of correct dance terminology.
    - II. Musical count with corresponding step count.
    - III. Stage directions for step counts.
    - IV. Head and hand movements with step counts.
    - V. Stick-drawings showing steps with start, directional arrows, and finish spot and pose.
    - VI. A preamble that includes:
      - 1) Thoughts regarding choice of music.
      - 2) What the music brought out in the choreographer.
      - 3) Possible costume ideas to add to the music (use drawings or fabric scraps for this if desired).
      - 4) Theme of dance/music.
    - VII. Be sure to include choreographer's name, date, and name of dance on the first page. Please advise participants that choreography notes are copyrightable.
    - VIII. **KEEP A PHOTOCOPY OF ALL NOTES** and a duplicate receipt of mail delivery, in the case there is a question or document misplaced or lost in the mail. Participants **MUST** present notes prior to performing.
    - IX. Notes may be emailed to the Festival office at [danceregistrations@kfpa.ca](mailto:danceregistrations@kfpa.ca).
3. Participants in Choreography are **NOT** permitted to wear costumes. Practice clothes **ARE REQUIRED** as follows:
  - a. Leotard or tight-fitting top, jazz pants, shorts or unitard in dark solid colour; hair tied back, footwear appropriate to the dance style.
  - b. **BALLET** – Solid, dark colour leotard and pink tights. RAD exam skirt optional.
4. PROPS permitted if USED during the dance.
5. **NO SPECIAL STAGE MAKEUP, ADORNMENTS, OR EXTRAS PERMITTED.**
6. Category begins at 10 YEARS and OVER.

4. When piano is included, the piano part must be original and not an orchestral reduction.
  5. There shall be no conductor.
  6. Instrumentation and amplification may be used but only as indicated in the original score.
  7. Maximum of two (2) music stands will be provided. Please bring your own music stands if you require additional.
  8. The **average age** of the group governs the class entered. See General Rule 7.
  9. Classes may be divided. See General Rule 26.
  10. Memorization is not required in this class.

State the number of singers in your choir for scheduling and set up. If titles are not submitted to the Discipline Representative by February 15, the entry will be Non-Competitive. See General Rule 36.
3. Classes may be divided. See General Rule 26.
4. \*An entry in Choral is based on the performance of TWO (2) CONTRASTING SELECTIONS:
  - a. One (1) of which may be a folk song.
  - b. One (1) of which may include a brief solo. The total number of bars of a solo or solo ensemble passage **may not exceed** 10 percent of the total score.
  - c. One (1) of which may be one or more movements of a multi movement work.
  - d. Total time limit: **15 minutes**.

9. Warm-up spaces and schedules will be assigned by KFPA. Maximum of fifteen (15) minutes. All choirs must adhere to assigned warm-up times or KFPA volunteer directions during the event.

9. All rights to the original works are retained by the composer.

  - a. Competitors who perform pieces listed in the appropriate syllabi **for their grade level** must perform the number of movements specified. If a different number of movements is performed, the entry falls into b) below and becomes an Own Choice entry.
  - b. Own Choice entries are those selections NOT listed in recognized syllabi. The mark for the performance of an Own Choice selection will include an assessment of the appropriateness of the choice.
  - c. Pieces in Suzuki editions may be entered in Competitive classes at the appropriate grade level.
  - d. ONE (1) class in each music discipline may be one (1) level or grade higher. See General Rule 14.

  - b. Own Choice entries are those selections NOT listed in recognized syllabi. The mark for the performance of an Own Choice selection will include an assessment of the appropriateness of the choice.
  - c. Pieces in Suzuki editions may be entered in Competitive classes at the appropriate grade level.
  - d. ONE (1) class in each music discipline may be one (1) level or grade higher. See General Rule 14.

3. To enter Musical Theatre classes, an entry in at least one Classical Voice class is encouraged.

Hand held props, that are integral to the performance, are allowed in addition to an 18"x18"x18" rehearsal block and a table for props. The rehearsal block and table will be provided. 6. Participants MUST provide a verbal introduction of their selections to **set the scene** as they begin their performance.

## APPENDIX 1 – GLOSSARY OF TERMS

GLOSSARY OF TERMS	
CLASS NAME	DESCRIPTION
20TH/21ST CENTURY	Music composed after 1900 as written by Bartok, Copland, Hindemith, Norton, Prokofiev, Schonberg et al. (typically List D pieces in Level 8 and higher in the RCM or CC syllabus).
ACCOMPANIMENT	A subordinate part for instruments, voices or ensembles – usually piano; although, one (1) or more other instruments are permitted in some classes.
ACTION SONG	A song having definite actions that all participants are expected to perform.
ADDITIONAL REPERTOIRE	For participants in Music who wish to perform an additional selection in a class already chosen that year. SOLO ENTRIES IN ADDITIONAL REPERTOIRE DO NOT QUALIFY FOR SCHOLARSHIP OR PROVINCIAL RECOMMENDATION. <b>EXCEPTION:</b> No Concerto in Additional Repertoire. See General Rule 20.
ADULT Competitive	Up to 22 YEARS. Exceptions: Choral – 19 and Over has no upper age restriction.
ADULT Non-Competitive	19 YEARS and OVER.
AMATEUR	A person whose principal means of livelihood is not obtained from the performance of music in the particular discipline in which he/she is competing. This stipulation does not, however, preclude such a person having occasionally received remuneration for musical services rendered, even in the area in which he/she is competing.
ARIA	*An elaborate, accompanied vocal solo from an opera or cantata.
ART SONG	The Art Song was a creation of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, and continues into the 20th and 21st centuries. These songs were written for voice with piano accompaniment. Composers such as Mozart, Schumann, Brahms, Schubert, Britten, Quilter, Barber, Bernstein, Rorem, Coulthard, Fleming, and their contemporaries, were inspired to write music to enhance existing poetry. An Art Song is a musical setting of a poem, suitable for recital. The language of the song determines the class entered, regardless of the composer's nationality. <b>Art Song</b> – as above and the song <b>MUST</b> have been set in English by the composer. <b>Art Song, French</b> – as above, a song by any recognized composer of French Art songs, to be sung in French. <b>Art Song, German</b> – as above, a song by any recognized composer of German Lieder, to be sung in German. <b>Art Song, Italian</b> – as above, a song by any recognized composer of Italian Art Songs, to be sung in Italian.

	<b>Art Song, Other Language</b> – to be sung in the original language. Other Language refers to any language not listed in the participant's age/level category.
<b>BACH AND TELEMANN STRINGS SOLO UNACCOMPANIED</b>	A composition written for unaccompanied solo string.
<b>BALLAD</b>	Music with a slower tempo, often of an introspective nature.
<b>BALLAD/ TRADITIONAL AIR</b>	A narrative poem, often of unknown origin and written in short stanzas. Was originally sung to a repeated tune.
<b>BAROQUE</b>	Music composed in or around the Baroque period, circa 1600-1760, as written by J.S. Bach, Couperin, Handel, Telemann, Scarlatti, Vivaldi, et al. or pieces written in the Baroque style (typically List A pieces in RCM or Group 1 in CC syllabus).
<b>CABARET</b>	A form of entertainment featuring music, song, dance, recitation, or drama. It is mainly distinguished by the performance venue, which might be a pub, a restaurant or a nightclub with a stage for performances.
<b>CANADIAN COMPOSER/ AUTHOR</b>	A person born in Canada, one who had resided in Canada for at least five (5) years, or a naturalized citizen of Canada.
<b>CANADIAN MUSIC</b>	Music composed by Canadian composers including Archer, Coulthard, Fleming, Louie, Niamath, Poole et al.
<b>CANADIAN POETRY</b>	Published poetry written by a Canadian author.
<b>CHAMBER MUSIC</b>	A term that originally referred to music not intended for the church, the theatre, or public concert hall. It no longer implies a place of performance, but refers to music written for three (3), four (4) or more instruments played with one (1) instrument to a 'part,' all parts having equal importance.
<b>CHOIR/CHORUS</b>	A group of any size performing as a single unit.
<b>CHORAL SPEECH/VERSE NON-COMPETITIVE</b>	The speaking of a piece of literature by a speech choir. It differs from Choric Drama in that the prime emphasis is on telling the story, rather than acting it out. The focus is on the language and the speaking of the text. There is no movement around the stage, but gestures and simple, in-place movements may be used. Variety may be provided through the division of voices, use of solo voices, the physical arrangement of the choir, use of props, and the suggestion of simple costume.
<b>CHORIC DRAMA NON-COMPETITIVE</b>	Distinguished from Choral Speech in that the choir enacts the story, as opposed to just telling the story through language. The choir may use theatrical elements such as dialogue, characterization and movement around the stage. Solo voices are featured and blocking (grouping) of individual speakers may be incorporated. Other theatrical elements such as scenery, costumes, and props may be used.
<b>CLASS</b>	Each discipline is divided into subcategories by instrument, and/or age, and/or by grade level. Each is labelled a 'Class.' Participants may enter only one (1) class in a group of classes. Exception: Chamber Group.

<b>CLASSICAL</b>	Music composed in or around the Classical period, circa 1750-1825, including Sonatinas, Sonatas, Theme and Variations and other forms as written by J.C. Bach, Beethoven, Clementi, Diabelli, Haydn, Mozart, et al. or pieces written in the Classical style (typically List B pieces in RCM or Group 2 in CC syllabus).
<b>CLASSICAL GUITAR</b>	A plucked stringed instrument originating in Spain.
<b>CLASSROOM MUSIC</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Music designed to portray the many facets of the elementary school program. Some movement/creative dance and use of simple instruments are encouraged. Costumes and stage props may be used.
<b>*CONCERT PROGRAM</b>	The purpose of this class is to allow students the opportunity to present a polished program. The content, quality of music and artistic arrangement will be taken into consideration by the adjudicator to determine a mark for overall impression and placement in the class. For scholarship purposes, an individual mark will be awarded for each selection. Selections must not be performed in any other class in the current year.
<b>COMMUNITY MUSIC</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	To foster music in the community and is open to two (2) or more participants who are from more than one (1) family.
<b>CONCERTO</b>	A composition written in several movements usually for solo instruments with orchestral accompaniment. In Festivals, a piano provides the orchestral part.
<b>CONTEMPORARY/MODERN</b>	In Music disciplines, a work written from 1900 to the present. In Speech Solo Scenes, a work written after 1950.
<b>CREATIVE STORYTELLING</b>	The adjudicator presents a picture to the participant whom then creates a story pertaining to that image. Participants will be given a quiet area for <b>unassisted study</b> . Participants may stand or be seated.
<b>DIPLOMA</b>	A selection of advanced difficulty that <b>MUST</b> be of at least post-Grade/post-Level 10 or equivalent level/standard.
<b>DISCIPLINE</b>	KFPA defines eleven (11) disciplines for administrative purposes: Chamber Group, Choral, Dance, Guitar, Harp, Instrumental, Music Composition, Piano, Speech and Dramatic Arts, Strings, and Voice.
<b>DRAMATIC MONOLOGUE</b>	A dramatic portrayal of a single character played by the participant. Movement is encouraged and a minimum of props and costuming is permitted. May be Prose or Poetry, <b>NOT</b> a scene from a published play.
<b>DRAMATIC POETRY</b>	Poetry which represents a situation involving characters. Dramatic conflict and dialogue are normally present in this type of poetry.
<b>DRAMATIC PROSE</b>	A literary expression that is <b>NOT</b> Poetry. Suitable selections will come from novels and short stories and will contain narration, description and dialogue. <b>NOT</b> to be acted out. Presentation may make use of an 'off-stage' focus.
<b>DUOLOGUE</b>	A speech selection for two (2) individuals performing different parts.
<b>*ENSEMBLE</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i> See Exceptions	A small group, the required size of which depends on the class entered. There can be one or more than one instrument per part.



	Exceptions: Duets able to be recommended to Provincials, Chamber Music and some Choirs are <b>COMPETITIVE</b> .
<b>FAMILY MUSIC</b>	Music performed by a group, of all whom, including the accompanist, are members of the same family.
<b>FLAMENCO GUITAR</b>	Describes accompaniments used in gypsy folk songs and dances of Spanish music.
<b>FOLK GUITAR</b>	Describes accompaniments of folk songs employing simple chords and arpeggios.
<b>FOLK SONG</b>	Music which has entered into the heritage of the people and which can usually be assigned to no composer, school or period. It has been fashioned and refashioned through many generations by countless individuals and usually passed on orally.
<b>FRENCH MUSIC</b>	Any single work by French Impressionists such as Fauré, Debussy, Ravel, Ibert, Poulenc, and their contemporaries.
<b>GESTURE</b>	Movement of the hands and arms, that clarifies or emphasizes the meaning and emotional content of a performance.
<b>GROUP CLASSES</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i> See Exceptions	Two (2) or more individuals performing as a unit. Exceptions: Duets able to be recommended to Provincials, Chamber Music and some Choirs are <b>COMPETITIVE</b> .
<b>GROUP SCENES</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	A scene of two (2) or more people taken from a published play. Two (2) or three (3) players are suggested. Original compositions are <b>NOT</b> permitted. Hand props and limited costuming may be used.
<b>HANDBELL</b>	A musically tuned bell with a handle made of leather or plastic that allows it to be held in the hand.
<b>HUMOROUS POEM</b>	A humorous poem can make you laugh, is witty, or has silly nonsensical humour to it.
<b>*JAZZ</b>	Jazz music has been, from its very beginnings at the turn of the 20 <sup>th</sup> century, a constantly evolving, expanding, changing music, passing through several distinctive phases of development. Jazz developed from ragtime and blues and is characterized by propulsive syncopated rhythms, polyphonic ensemble playing, and varying degrees of improvisation.
<b>LIEDER</b>	A distinctive type of German vocal solo composition that was an outcome of the Romantic Movement of the late 18th and early 19th centuries. In Lieder, the quality of the verse is very important. The piano part is more than an accompaniment and, as does the vocal part, demands artistic interpretation.
<b>LIGHT OPERA/OPERETTA</b>	A type of comic or light-hearted opera containing spoken dialogue.
<b>LYRIC POETRY</b>	Frequently exhibits a graceful, fluid rhythm and an evocative pattern of sound. It is reflective poetry, and although a lyric may relate an incident or episode, the story element is of secondary importance. Lyric generally describes a short poem, neither narrative nor dramatic, having as its subject, the poet's personal feelings – real or assumed. It could be in the form of a song, an ode, or a sonnet, dealing with a single situation or idea.

<b>MADRIGAL</b>	A composition for several voices, performed unaccompanied. The texts of a madrigal are usually secular.
<b>MIME</b>	A silent art form that uses body and face as instruments of communication. The art of mime is based on careful and sensitive observation, and the translation of that observation, along with thoughts and emotion into movement and expression so as to express a mood or present a scenario. The participant <b>MUST</b> communicate character, storyline, location, and emotion clearly. Skills such as economy of movement, eye focus, the ability to position objects, and maintain consistency of distance are vital. While classical mime skills may be incorporated into the mime work, the focus is on the piece as an artistic whole – as a scene driven by personal communication.
<b>MIXED CHOIR/CHORUS</b>	A group of female and male singers performing as a unit.
<b>MUSIC COMPOSITION</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Music composed by the participant.
<b>MUSICAL THEATRE</b>	A musical stage-play/production or motion-picture musical having a plot developed by dialogue interspersed with songs and often containing dances. The 'Broadway Musical' is representative of this genre.
<b>MUSICAL THEATRE COMEDY OR SCENE</b>	A comedy usually includes some dialogue and/or movement to effectively place the song in its context in the musical. Where appropriate, costumes, props, and movement are permitted in this class.
<b>MUSICAL THEATRE BALLAD</b>	A ballad is a solo song, roughly equivalent to a soliloquy in a play, usually somewhat slow and introspective. Costumes, props and movement are permitted, but are often downplayed in the ballad genre.
<b>NARRATIVE/ DRAMATIC POETRY</b>	Poetry that tells a story and stresses plot and action. It often contains dialogue, characterization and conflict. Although narrative/dramatic poetry may contain lyrical or descriptive passages, it usually minimizes or ignores the poet's expression of personal feelings. Movement and gestures should flow naturally from the text and the participant's interpretation. Simple costumes and props may be used.
<b>NON-COMPETITIVE CLASS</b>	A class in which there is no mark given and no placement made. Any class may be entered as Non-Competitive. Some classes are <b>ONLY</b> Non-Competitive. These classes are <b>NOT</b> eligible for scholarship or for recommendation to the Provincial Festival.
<b>NOVELTY SCENE</b>	A scene with two (2) or more people, taken from a published play. Original compositions are <b>NOT</b> permitted. Hand props and limited costuming may be used. It may contain song, dance, and music.
<b>NOVICE</b>	A NOVICE participant is one who has had <b>NO</b> dance lessons in the competing category of dance (i.e. Jazz, Tap, Ballet, etc.) before the SEPTEMBER immediately preceding the Festival.
<b>OBBLIGATO</b>	An accompaniment that has a distinct character and independence providing special or unusual effects, and is an integral part of the composition.

<b>OPEN</b>	A class for those participants who have completed the Diploma level and are still studying at school/university. Participants are eligible for scholarships and awards and for Provincial recommendation.
<b>OPEN DUO</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Selections to be taken from a published classic or modern play, including the works of William Shakespeare, in which the participants portray two (2) characters whose speeches are being spoken. It is recommended participants select characters appropriate to own age and gender. Participants may be different ages, as long as both are within the ages specified in the Speech and Dramatic Arts Syllabus. It is staged as if the scene were taken from the complete performance. A minimum of props and costuming is permitted. These classes are <b>NOT</b> eligible for scholarship or for recommendation to the Provincial Festival.
<b>OPERATIC SOLO</b>	See ARIA.
<b>ORATORIO</b>	Drama which may be sacred or secular and set to music. It contains all the elements of an opera, but is seldom staged.
<b>ORIGINAL POEM</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	A poem written by the participant.
<b>OWN CHOREOGRAPHY</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Dance created by the participant. Music composed by the participant.
<b>PERCUSSION</b>	Includes all mallet percussion instruments, timpani, and all drums except drum set.
<b>POETRY DUO</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	A poetry selection for two (2) individuals performing different parts. Poems that have conversations, dialogues, or have two (2) distinct moods work well.
<b>*POP</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Pop music selections may be chosen from popular genres, movies and TV music. Solo entries in Pop do not qualify for scholarship or Provincial recommendation.
<b>POPULAR VOCAL</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	Includes Movie, TV, Pop, Soft Rock, Vocal Jazz, Western and Contemporary Gospel music. Not Musical Theatre.
<b>POST-ROMANTIC</b>	Music composed in the style of the Romantic period composed after 1900, as written by Albeniz, Granados, Grechaninov, Kabelevsky, Medtner, Rachmaninov, Scriabin, Sibelius et al.
<b>PRELIMINARY</b> <i>NON-COMPETITIVE</i>	A category for a performance in any discipline by a participant who has not reached a graded level of training. <b>See Discipline Rules for submitting selection titles.</b>
<b>PRODUCTION NUMBER</b>	A performance assisted by a background ensemble. See Dance for Stage Production Number. See Voice for Musical Theatre Production Number.
<b>PROPS</b>	Objects used to enhance a presentation usually in a Musical Theatre, some Solo Speech classes, Choral Speech, and Choric Drama. Props should be simple, limited in number, and an integral part of the performance.
<b>PUBLIC DOMAIN</b>	Compositions and works that are no longer subject to copyright and are in the public domain.

<b>PUBLIC SPEAKING</b>	<b>MUST</b> be the participant's original selection. In public speaking, proper use of notes is mandatory. Evidence of memorization could disqualify the participant.
<b>PUBLIC SPEAKING (EXTEMPORANEOUS)</b>	A topic chosen by the adjudicator will be made available to each participant approximately five (5) minutes prior to the class. Each participant will then be required to speak on his/her topic.
<b>READERS THEATRE</b>	A form of group interpretation that can represent the staging of all kinds of literature. Could be a single story or a variety based on one (1) theme. Participants read from a prepared script. Two (2) or more voices, suggestion of costume or props. Readers sit or stand to speak. Characters and plot are conveyed through voice, facial expressions and a minimum of movement and/or gestures.
<b>RENAISSANCE</b>	Music composed in or around the Renaissance period, circa 1400-1600, or in the Renaissance style.
<b>REVUE</b>	A topical, satirical theatrical entertainment consisting of a series of scenes having a central theme, but no plot.
<b>ROMANTIC</b>	Music composed in or around the Romantic period, circa 1810-1920, as written by Brahms, Chopin, Grieg, Mendelssohn, Schumann, Tchaikovsky et al. or pieces written in the Romantic style (typically List C pieces in RCM or Group C in CC syllabus).
<b>SACRED ARIA</b>	An aria from any recognized major sacred work, such as oratorio, cantata, requiem, mass, motet or passion (preferably with recitative, if applicable). May be sung in the original language or English translation.
<b>SACRED SONG</b>	Works from any faith with a religious, Biblical, or liturgical text or theme. Not from an oratorio, cantata, mass, motet or other concerted sacred work. Not Contemporary Gospel.
<b>SCHOOL CHOIR/CHORUS</b>	A Group of any size from one (1) school, performing as a unit. May choose to be Competitive OR Non-Competitive.
<b>SEA SHANTY</b>	A song originally sung by sailors. Similar in origin to a folk song.
<b>SELECTION</b>	Any accredited or recognized examination Syllabus may be used as a guide to determine a selection. Maybe one (1) or more movements of a multi-movement composition: e.g. Song cycle, sonata, concerto, or concerted work.
<b>SHAKESPEARE SOLO</b>	An excerpt from a play, by William Shakespeare, in which the participant portrays one (1) character whose speech is being spoken. It is recommended participants select a character appropriate to own age and gender. It is staged as if the scene were taken from the complete performance. A minimum of props and costuming is permitted.
<b>SIGHT PLAYING/READING/SINGING</b>	The performance of a selection by a participant who has had only a few minutes preparation.
<b>SLAM POETRY</b>	Idea or thematic connection poems with voice, humour, rhythm, exaggeration or wordplay. These poems are written for performance to an audience. Excerpts may be presented as these poems are often very long.

<b>SOLO SCENE</b>	In speech, a dramatic sketch taken from a published play (excluding Shakespeare). The participant plays the character. Movement is encouraged and a minimum of props and costuming permitted.
<b>SONATA</b>	A composition usually written in three (3) or four (4) movements for solo instrument, with or without piano accompaniment. The solo instrument and accompaniment are of equal importance, although, generally, only the soloist is adjudicated.
<b>SONNET</b>	A lyric poem of fourteen (14) lines, usually Iambic Pentameter, with a specific rhythm scheme or structure.
<b>SONNET SEQUENCE</b>	Two (2) Sonnets with a similar theme, not necessarily by the same author.
<b>SPANISH GUITAR</b>	Music written by a Spanish or Latin composer.
<b>STORY READING</b>	Reading a story. The original book <b>MUST</b> be used on stage. May not be acted out. Vocal characterization is encouraged. Although eye contact with the audience is important, the selection is <b>NOT</b> to be memorized. Participants are encouraged to select material at their own grade level or above. Participants may stand or be seated.
<b>STORYTELLING</b>	Storytelling is the interactive art of using words to reveal the elements and images of a story while encouraging the listener's imagination. The selection of storytelling can include an original story or the competitor's adaptation of a folktale, fairy tale, myth, legend or story. See Storytelling class in Speech and Dramatic Arts for full details.
<b>UNACCOMPANIED</b>	A selection written for solo or group, and performed without instrumental assistance.
<b>UNCHANGED VOICE</b>	Refers to a singer, usually male, whose voice has not yet 'broken' – changed from an adolescent to an adult sound.
<b>VOCAL VARIETY</b>	For participants who wish to perform one selection from light opera, operetta, a Gilbert and Sullivan production, a revue or cabaret. Classical Voice or Musical Theatre selections <b>NOT</b> permitted in Vocal Variety at the local level. <b>SOLO ENTRIES IN VOCAL VARIETY DO NOT QUALIFY FOR SCHOLARSHIP OR PROVINCIAL RECOMMENDATION.</b> However, Vocal Variety selections may be used in the Vocal Variety parallel class at Provincials.

## APPENDIX 2 – SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

The following **GENERAL RULES** apply to Scholarships, Awards, Trophies and Plaques.

See below for **REQUIREMENTS BY DISCIPLINES**.

Scholarship and award amounts are dependent upon funds received annually by KFPA.

45. Please read the scholarship requirements described for specific disciplines carefully. Failure to comply with specific discipline rules will result in Non-Competitive status only, which does not qualify for scholarships.
46. To be considered for scholarships, participants must perform from memory unless otherwise indicated in the specific discipline rules. See General Rule 22.
47. A Technique class is required in each of the Ballet, Modern and Stage genres to be eligible for Scholarship and Provincial Recommendation in any one genre. You may receive more than one scholarship or award but can only be recommended to Provincials in ONE class. A separate registration must be received for each genre. See Dance Rules for more details.
48. In a concert program class, each solo selection with a minimum mark of 85 percent will count as one (1) class towards a scholarship. Concert Programs begin at the Grade 7 level in all disciplines.
49. Adult and Group classes do not qualify for scholarships.
50. In the awarding of Scholarships and Special Awards, the decision of the Festival Board is final.
51. Solo entries in all disciplines must achieve a mark of AT LEAST 85 to qualify for scholarships. See Scholarships and Awards at the conclusion of each discipline.
52. Scholarships will be awarded to a winning participant for two (2) consecutive years only in the same age, grade, or level. Exceptions: Age levels in Speech and Dramatic Arts and Dance which are greater than two (2) years and Grades 9 through Open where more than one year may be spent per grade.
53. Adjudicators' Choice Encouragement Awards are awarded to those participants who show promise, commitment and passion for their discipline. Adjudicator decisions are not necessarily based on marks. Awards are at the adjudicator's discretion. To be eligible, a participant must perform in two (2) contrasting solos in the same discipline. Exception: ONE (1) entry only required to be eligible for the Music Composition and the Chamber Group Adjudicators' Choice Encouragement Awards. Note: A Technique class in Dance is not a solo.

## TROPHIES AND PLAQUES

54. All trophies and plaques shall be held by the winners until the next Festival. These are annual awards and cannot be won outright or in any way become the property of individuals.
55. Winners will have their names engraved on trophies in advance of trophy receipt as provided by the society. The appearance of the award/trophy cannot be changed in any manner by the recipient(s). Please return trophies cleaned and in good order to the Festival office or your venue in the following year.
56. **KFPA DOREEN HAUGHTON AWARD**

To be eligible for this award, the applicant must:

- a. Submit a formal resumé, including cover letter, before **February 1**.

- b. Be a Grade 12 student immediately continuing on to post-secondary studies majoring in the Performing Arts at an accredited institution.

The following will be taken into consideration for those applying for the KFPA Doreen Haughton Award:

- a. Marks received during the current and previous Festivals.
- b. The adjudicator's recommendation of the Most Promising in that discipline, if applicable.

NOTE:

- a. Only one (1) award will be given out in any year.
- b. The final choice of the award recipient will be made by the KFPA Board.

## 57. KAMLOOPS SYMPHONY MENTORSHIP AWARD

Please enter by **December 10** and apply following the current requirements. \*It is the responsibility of the entrant to provide the video recording needed to audition with the Kamloops Symphony Society. Contact [scholarships@kfpa.ca](mailto:scholarships@kfpa.ca) for more information.

The KFPA is pleased to include this award in collaboration with the Kamloops Symphony Society and its Music Director. Candidates chosen by adjudicators in specified disciplines will audition by video recording with the Kamloops Symphony Music Director and/or designates.

- a. This award is designed for candidates who in the view of the Kamloops Symphony Music Director and/or designates would at this stage in their development benefit from an opportunity to work with the Symphony in the season following the Festival.
- b. To be considered for the Kamloops Symphony Mentorship Award, participants enter ONE of the following eligible set of classes each with a **TIME LIMIT** of 30 minutes:
  - i. **Piano, Strings and Instrumentalists – Grade 10 and Up ONLY.**
    - 1. A Concerto class OR
    - 2. A Concert Program class
  - ii. **Voice – Intermediate D, Senior C and Open ONLY.**
    - 1. A Concert Program class – one of which **MUST** be Opera OR
    - 2. Any three (3) classes – one (1) of which **MUST** be Opera. One may be Musical Theatre.
- c. Adjudicators are not required to recommend a candidate if they feel there is no suitable participant.
- d. The winner of the Kamloops Symphony Mentorship Award will receive:
  - i. Participation in personalized professional mentorship opportunities provided by the Kamloops Symphony Society based on the applicant's written submission. See details below.
  - ii. Depending on the instrument, the Kamloops Symphony Music Director and/or designates may at their discretion invite the winner to perform with the Kamloops Symphony, either as a soloist or as part of the section of the orchestra.
  - iii. A scholarship of \$250 provided by the Kamloops Symphony Society.
  - iv. The KFPA Norm Wiwcharuk Memorial Plaque.
- e. The Kamloops Symphony Society reserves the right to withhold the award (or any corresponding portion of the prize) should no applicants be deemed at a suitable level.

### **RULES FOR ENTRY**

Only open to Grade 10 and Up in Guitar, Harp, Instrumental, Piano, Strings, and Intermediate D, Senior C and Open in Voice. Candidates must comply with the requirements as outlined in their specific disciplines.

- a. At the time of registration, the applicant must indicate their intention to be considered for the Kamloops Symphony Mentorship Award and register for the appropriate class(es) before the Festival registration deadline. No late entries accepted.
- b. The applicant must submit a written application to the KFPA within 3 weeks after the KFPA Honours Concert.
- c. The applicant must arrange to have his/her performance of the chosen eligible class(es) recorded at the scheduled time during Festival. All video recordings become the property of the KFPA.
- d. Candidates are expected to perform from memory.
- e. Only amateur musicians are eligible. Professional musicians will NOT be considered for this award. See General Rule 2.
- f. Candidates chosen to participate in the Kamloops Symphony Membership Award program are not eligible to apply again.

### **APPLICATION PROCESS**

- a. To be considered for the award, the applicant must enter ONE of the eligible classes by entry deadline. See list of classes under Rules for Entry.
- b. Once the class(es) have been identified by the applicant, no changes will be accepted, except on strict written approval from the KFPA.
- c. Entry fee at time of registration is \$100. No refunds will be given. See General Rule 5.
- d. Following the conclusion of the eligible class(es) in any discipline, the adjudicator may choose to recommend up to two (2) applicants per discipline. Adjudicators are not required to recommend any applicants if they feel there is no suitable candidate.
- e. The application for the Kamloops Symphony Mentorship Award and the performance video are to be sent to KFPA by email to [scholarships@kfpa.ca](mailto:scholarships@kfpa.ca) within three weeks after the KFPA Honours Concert. KFPA will then send the package to the Musical Director and designates at KSS for deliberation.
- f. Following the Festival, all recorded performances and written submissions from adjudicator-recommended applicants will be reviewed by the Kamloops Symphony Music Director and/or designates for consideration. The Music Director and/or designates will then select a winner of the award, if appropriate.
- g. The winner will be notified by the Kamloops Symphony Society. Awards will be disbursed at a later date.
- h. The Kamloops Symphony Society will work with the individual to tailor their individualized mentorship opportunities.

- e. The final choice of award recipient will be made by the KFPA Scholarship and Awards Committee.
